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Magic Arcana
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How Loaming Shaman Got his Back Legs

As we've seen before, the act of creating a **Magic** card is a dynamic and protean process that touches design, development, and creative teams in equal parts. To take a *Dissension* example, graveyard hoser **Loaming Shaman** started out with this text:

```
[Graveyard Guy]
Creature
At the beginning of your upkeep, you may shuffle any number of target creature
cards in a single graveyard into their owner's library.
1/1
```

First to change was the creature's ability. Instead of every upkeep, it was changed to trigger once when it came into play, but was allowed to target non-creature cards.

[Graveyard Guy]
Creature
When CARDNAME comes into play, target player shuffles any number of target cards
from his or her graveyard into his or her library.
1/1
```

Meanwhile, the critter got a flavor facelift, giving him the concept of a recycling-minded nature shaman whose compost heap is full of the bones of the dead.

```
[Composting Shaman]
Creature - Human Shaman
When CARDNAME comes into play, target player shuffles any number of target cards
from his or her graveyard into his or her library.
1/1
```

In line with this concept, artist Carl Critchlow sent in this sketch:

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The next thing to change was the critter's power and toughness. It became 3/2 in order to give it some beef after it had performed its graveyard-hosing duties:

[Composting Shaman]

Creature - Human Shaman

When CARDNAME comes into play, target player shuffles any number of target cards from his or her graveyard into his or her library.

Suddenly, the flavor was off. This guy was too big to be represented by a single Human creature, especially a Shaman. The creative team suggested a switch to the Centaur creature type, and Carl Critchlow submitted this second sketch:
